Proper hand hygiene is the number one way to prevent the spread of infection. EVERYONE—health care professionals, patients, residents, families, and volunteers—should clean their hands thoroughly and at appropriate times to prevent the spread of disease. The term hand hygiene includes both the use of alcohol-based hand sanitizers with at least 60% alcohol when hands are not visibly dirty and washing with soap and water.

Hand Hygiene – Use these images, messages, and links in your public social media and internal staff education.

Message 1: Frequent and thorough hand hygiene is one of the best ways to avoid getting sick. Learn more by visiting <u>Handwashing: Clean Hands Save Lives</u> Tip: When using soap and water, wash for at least 15 seconds which is about the same amount of time to sing "Happy Birthday" twice. When using an alcohol-based hand sanitizer, rub hands together covering all surfaces of your hands until they feel dry which is around 20 seconds. #PatientSafetyAwareness #UnitedForPatientSafety

- Message 3:80% of germs are transferred by touch. Visit the CDC Handwashing Campaign to learnhow Life is Better with Clean Hands. #PatientSafetyAwareness #UnitedForPatientSafety



- Message 4: As a patient or visitor at a hospital, you should Speak Up for clean hands. Protect yourself by cleaning your own hands and speak up, don't be afraid to use your voice to ask if your caregivers have performed hand hygiene. <u>CDC Hand Hygiene</u> #PatientSafetyAwareness #UnitedForPatientSafety
- Message 5: Stay healthy by making handwashing a regular part of your cooking routine. Wash hands to prevent spreading germs to your food and your family. <u>Handwashing: A</u> <u>Healthy Habit in the Kitchen</u>. #PatientSafetyAwareness #UnitedForPatientSafety
- Message 6: Public toilets and door handles harbor all kinds of germs. Avoid the spread of germs and use a paper towel to flush the toilet and open the door.
